## Heater Safety

Almost half of U.S. families use alternate sources of heat to stay warm during the winter months. Heating equipment causes more than 65,000 home fires each year and is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths.

Portable space heaters are convenient but do increase the risk for house fires.

### Safety tips when using space heaters:

- Never leave space heaters unattended
- Never plug space heaters into a power strip or extension cord and always unplug them when not in use
- Place on a flat, level surface and never on cabinets, tables, furniture, or carpet
- Keep a 3-foot area free of combustible material around the heater
- Never allow children or pets to play within a 3-foot radius of a space heater
- Never use space heaters to warm bedding, cook food, dry clothing, or thaw pipes
- Inspect the heater for damage such as frayed wires and cracked or broken plugs, do not use if the damage is noted

## Epilepsy Awareness

Epilepsy is a broad term used for a brain disorder that causes seizures.

- Stay with the person and keep them safe by moving them away from anything that could harm them
- Time the seizure
- Turn them on their side if they are not awake and aware
- Never put anything in their mouth or restrain them
- Call 911 if the seizure lasts longer than 5 minutes; repeated seizures; difficulty breathing; seizure occurs in water; the person is injured, pregnant, or sick; the person does not return to their usual state, first-time seizure; or the person asks for medical help

# Heater Safety

Almost half of U.S. families use alternate sources of heat to stay warm during the winter months. Heating equipment causes more than 65,000 home fires each year and is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths. Half of all reported home fires occur during the months of December, January, and February. Portable space heaters are convenient but do increase the risk for house fires.

## Here are some tips to keep you and your family safe when using space heaters:

- Never leave space heaters unattended
- Never plug space heaters into a power strip or extension cord and always unplug them when not in use
- Place on a flat, level surface and never on cabinets, tables, furniture, or carpet
- Keep a 3-foot area free of combustible material around the heater
- Never allow children or pets to play within a 3-foot radius of a space heater
- Never use space heaters to warm bedding, cook food, dry clothing, or thaw pipes
- Inspect the heater for damage such as frayed wires and cracked or broken plugs. Do not use if the damage is noted

## Home Safety Tips:

- Test smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries yearly
- Having a working smoke alarm reduces the risk of dying in a fire by nearly half
- In case of fire, get down low, get out, and call 911. Never go back inside for people, pets, or things
- Have a plan and a designated meeting spot outside. Practice the plan so that everyone knows what to do
